A very warm welcome to all those joining us in our virtual worship, and in Church at Holy Trinity and St Peter's. It is wonderful we can worship in our various places as part of the body of Christ.

Introduction

This week's theme is the Witnessing Community.

Jesus gave us a specific commandment to go into the world with the Good News. Mark Chapter 16 verse 15: 'He said to them "Go into all the world and preach the good news to all creation."

This is known as the Great Commission, which is both a duty and a privilege. It involves us sharing our heartfelt faith in God. We are not required to argue or debate anyone to heaven we are merely asked to share the Good News. Like a witness in a court case we are to be a witness to the Gospel.

What is the most important experience in our lives?Knowing Jesus Christ as our Saviour.

What is the most important thing we can do for another person? Help them to know God.

We hope our worship today will help us to share our faith and love for God with others.

Opening Prayers

Confession

Let us begin by reflecting on the week that has just passed: Consider the things which we have done, or not done, and our thoughts which we now wish to say sorry to God for:

Collect for today

O God, you declare your almighty power most chiefly in showing mercy and pity: mercifully grant to us such a measure of your grace, that we, running the way of your commandments, may receive your gracious promises, and be made partakers of your heavenly treasure; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen

Readings for today

Faithful Creator, whose mercy never fails: deepen our faithfulness to you and to your living Word, who is Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

The New Testament reading today is Romans 12: 1-8 New International Version (NIV)

1 Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship. 2 Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will.

3 For by the grace given me I say to every one of you: Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the faith God has distributed to each of you.

4 For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, 5 so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. 6 We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith;

7 if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; 8 if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully.

Today, we would like to look at the same reading but using The Message version.


12 1-2 So here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life—your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life—and place it before God as an offering. Embracing what God does for you is the best thing you can do for him. Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out. Readily recognize what he wants from you, and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity, God brings the best out of you, develops well-formed maturity in you. 3 I'm speaking to you out of deep gratitude for all that God has given me, and especially as I have responsibilities in relation to you. Living then, as every one of you does, in pure grace, it's important that you not misinterpret yourselves as people who are bringing this goodness to God. No, God brings it all to you. The only accurate way to understand ourselves is by what God is and by what he does for us, not by what we are and what we do for him.

4-6 In this way we are like the various parts of a human body. Each part gets its meaning from the body as a whole, not the other way around. The body we're talking about is Christ's body of chosen people. Each of us finds our meaning and function as a part of his body. But as a chopped-off finger or cut-off toe we wouldn't amount to much, would we? So since we find ourselves fashioned into all these

excellently formed and marvellously functioning parts in Christ's body, let's just go ahead and be what we were made to be, without enviously or pridefully comparing ourselves with each other, or trying to be something we aren't. 7-8 If you preach, just preach God's Message, nothing else; if you help, just help, don't take over; if you teach, stick to your teaching; if you give encouraging guidance, be careful that you don't get bossy; if you're put in charge, don't manipulate; if you're called to give aid to people in distress, keep your eyes open and be quick to respond; if you work with the disadvantaged, don't let yourself get irritated with them or depressed by them. Keep a smile on your face.

Opening Prayer

Introduction

Some of you may remember the Rev James Jasper from Ansley who told me that if you really wanted to know what God requires; look in the King James Bible.

At our weekly house group (remember those), we often use and refer to different Bible translations – and sometimes one version makes things clearer to some – which I hope you found today by comparing the same Bible reading from the New International Version (NIV) and The Message.


We have different versions of the Bible for several reasons. First of all, the newer translations translate from older and more reliable manuscripts which were not available when the 1611 King James Version was translated, and secondly, there are different styles of translating.

Many scholars believe that the Book of Romans is Apostle Paul's masterpiece explaining God's plan of salvation by grace, through faith in Jesus Christ.

Divinely inspired, Paul passed on truths that are followed by Christian believers to this day.

Outlines of the Book of Romans often divide it into two parts: a theological explanation of the Gospel (chapters 1-11) and a series of tangible and practical ways forward (chapters 12-15).

Having theory before practice suggests that what we do depends on what we believe.



ROMANS 12: 1-2. PRESENT YOUR BODIES A LIVING SACRIFICE

Paul encourages us to respond by offering ourselves to be transformed by God and engage in the work of God's kingdom.

The requirement is no longer ceremonial animal killing, but presentation of a person to God - a living sacrifice - dedicated to serving God - committed to doing God's will - a life lived in faith and lived out in faithfulness.

Paul invites us open ourselves in body and mind to what God might do in, with, and through us.

For some this may require radical change, like a caterpillar metamorphosing (transforming or changing) into a butterfly.

For a time, it is one thing, but then by God's grace, it becomes a wholly different thing.

The caterpillar is not beautiful, but the butterfly is.

The caterpillar crawls, but the butterfly flies on gossamer wings.

Gardeners don't like caterpillars, but they grow special plants to attract butterflies.

By God's grace and the work of the Holy Spirit, we too can be transformed into something wholly different - metamorphosing into Christ-like people.

It starts with our honest and humble admission that we are prone to following the world's standards and through our conforming, inaction, and silence, we have been complicit in the increase of conflict and unrest within our society.

Secondly, we must first know what God's will is for us as an individual – which is a puzzle for many people.

Leviticus 1:1-2

Then the LORD called to Moses and spoke to him from the tent of meeting, saying, 2 "Speak to the sons of Israel and say to them, "When any man of you brings an offering to the LORD, you shall bring your offering of animals from the herd or the flock.""

GOD'S PRESENCE IS NOT A REWARD FOR GOOD BEHAVIOR. Jt is the means TO SEEING OUR BEHAVIOR transformed.



his is what God asks of you only this .. o act justly o love tender ly, and To walk humbly with you

If we are to discern God's will, it will not be by trying to remake God in our own image; but by allowing the Holy Spirit to renew our thinking and allowing God to shape our lives.

As we become transformed, we are able to make assessments about our own conduct, thoughts, or words: to recognise whether we are behaving in a manner pleasing to God or not - and then change our behaviour accordingly. ... ADD TO YOUR FAITH VIRTUE, TO VIRTUE KNOWLEDGE, TO KNOWLEDGE SELF-CONTROL, TO SELF-CONTROL PERSEVERANCE GODLINESS, TO GODLINESS BROTHERLY KINDNESS, AND TO BROTHERLY KINDNESS LOVE. -2 PETER 1:5-7 NKJV

This is a part of the renewing of our minds that takes place within us to live out our identity as the transformed body of Christ.

ROMANS 12: 3. NOT TO THINK OF YOURSELF MORE HIGHLY

Paul warns us not to think more highly of ourselves than we should.

Everyone has a different measure of faith and how we live our lives will differ to others.


Unfortunately, some believe that their particular gifts make them superior to others, to the detriment of the Church and its mission to proclaim the Gospel.

We must not pretend to have more or less faith than we have.

Instead, determine your measure of faith and live accordingly.

We must welcome and receive anyone, even though they may be weaker in their faith than us.

We must not criticise or judge them for having different ideas about what is right or wrong.





We may think something is all right for us, but if it causes someone to stumble and we continue to do it, then we are not walking in love.

Do not let your autonomy ruin someone for whom Christ died.

We must not to do anything that would cause our good to be spoken evil of, even though we think it right for us.

God wants our lives to be a living sacrifice.

ROMANS 12: 4-5. WE ARE ONE BODY IN CHRIST

The human body has many parts that contribute to its welfare and each part enjoys the benefits of contributions made by others.

If the various parts were competing rather than cooperating - seeking to gain advantage instead of contributing unselfishly - the body would cease to function effectively.

So it is with the Church, which has many members, with differing gifts, able to contribute in particular ways.

Instead of competing or quarrelling, rendering the Church body less effective to the detriment of all its members, the Church works best when working in harmony.

Rather than viewing "faith" as a personal commitment, it makes better sense to view it as "the faith" - working out our faith as a body; a community of believers.

We are not one body despite our diversity - we are one body because of our diversity.

I believe that through the unity and diversity of the Church, we can preserve the only true community outside of the family.



As each has received a gift, use it to **serve one another**, as good stewards of God's varied grace: 1 Peter 4:10 (ESV)



How good and pleasant it is when

dwell together in unity: Psalm 133:1

ROMANS 12: 6-8. HAVING GIFTS DIFFERING ACCORDING TO GRACE

Our motives in seeking or accepting roles in our Church are crucial.

If we serve out of love for Christ, we can expect that Christ will bless our service. If we serve for selfish reasons, we cannot expect that our service will be a blessing to anyone.

Paul mentions seven specific gifts for us:

1. Prophecy:

Paul suggests a considered approach by which the prophet acts as a spokesperson for God into the community - in the same way that the clergy speaks for God.

2. Ministry (or service):

It is likely that Paul means an *ad hoc* approach is required; meeting people's needs as they arise rather than dedicating ourselves to a 'life of service'.

3. Teaching:

Teaching is an important gift. It is not just the passing on of information but is instead a more interpretative role - recognising how that knowledge should be communicated.

4. Exhorting (or as an encourager):

There is nothing more destructive than people who see it as their life's work to whinge, moan, complain and undermine. How much more beautiful to be an encourager.

5. **Giving:**

While it is true that most people do not, as individuals, have millions of pounds at their disposal, it is also true that the gifts of millions of ordinary but generous Christians do great service for God's work. Stand firm and don't be shaken. Always keep busy working for the LORD. You know that everything you do for Him is worthwhile. 1 CORINTHIANS 15:58

For prophecy never had its origin in the human will, but prophets, though human, spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit. (2 Peter 1:21 NIV)

"Love one another" (1 John 3:11) "Love one another" (1 John 3:23) "Love one another" (1 John 4:7) "Love one another" (1 John 4:11) "Love one another" (1 John 4:12)

Start children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old they will not turn from it. - Proverbs 22.6 (NIV) -

Therefore encourage one another and build each other up 1 Thessalonians 5:11

... Whoever refreshes others will be refreshed. Proverbs 11:25

6. Leadership:

Leaders need a vision for what needs to be done and the ability to work well with other people.

7. Compassion (or showing mercy):

Here it takes on the sense of being a protector: someone able to look out for those who are vulnerable, on the margins or being denied their rights.

Find your gift and your passion in life and give yourself diligently and cheerfully to it.

When you use your gift fully for the glory of God, you begin to light little torches along the way to show people through the darkness to the light of Jesus Christ.

SUMMARY

Romans 12 is a call to action. It starts with us showing up and leads us into being the body of Christ.

Do you want to present your body as a living sacrifice and renew your mind as Paul challenges?

Then seek to live out your measure of faith and exercise your gift(s) in a way that best contributes to the body of Christ


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
- Speaking God's word into our community;
- Meeting the needs of people as they arise;
- Teaching and interpreting God's word to others;
- Encouraging everyone;
- Sharing possessions with those in need;
- Advocating on behalf of those who have no voice; and
- Meeting the needs of the poor.

"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." James 1:5

Do not merely look out for your own personal interests, but also for the interests of others. Philippians 2:4

2 Timothy 2:15 ¹⁵ Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a workman who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth. (NIV)





It would not be a bad vision to see each of these ministries come to maturity in our own Church.

Then we truly would begin to reflect Christ to the world, wouldn't we?

How can we – flawed human beings with selfish tendencies – ever portray God's flawless image? The answer is: Simply follow the leading of the Holy Spirit. If we, as followers of Christ, are truly abiding by His Word, then we will reflect His character.

May God greatly bless you if you choose to present yourself as living sacrifice to Him.

Church Services

All services, for the time being, at Holy Trinity will start at 10am (there will be no 9am service on the second Sunday- it will be 10am).

Services at St Peter's will start at our usual time there at 10.30am.

There is no communion, or refreshments, at present.

To comply with all the Covid-19 secure advice unfortunately we are going to be very restricted on numbers who can attend at both churches.

Because of the restrictions if you wish to attend a service at either church you need to ring or email Heather to ask to be put on a list of attendance for a Sunday. This is vital as we do not want to turn people away.

Those able to attend will be contacted so please do not turn up if you have not been informed that you can attend. A Guidance note has been prepared for all those attending- please read it carefully.

It is compulsory that face coverings are worn in the Church buildings so please come prepared. Church leaders/preachers/pray-ers are permitted to temporarily lift their face coverings when speaking...but for congregation members it is now mandatory to wear them inside church at all times.

For those not able to attend we will be continuing with services being sent out by email and resources being sent in the post as at present.

The Churches' Premises are still closed to everyone outside service times and entry can only take place with the agreement of Heather or in her absence the Churchwardens – please do not attempt to access them with any keys that you may have.

We would ask for your prayers during what is going to be a difficult and developing situation.

Daily Hope

Daily Hope is a <u>free phone line</u> of hymns, reflections and prayers launched by the Church of England. It has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind. So, if you know someone in this situation, please phone them and tell them about free-phone **0800 804 8044**, and why not try it for yourselves.

Food Bank

Due to the restrictions in church during services we are **still not able** to continue with the bringing of items to Church or deliveries to the warehouse. We will review that as restrictions are lifted.

This is at a time when the Food Bank is still under huge pressure, especially now that schools are on holiday.

The Food Bank is still working with its volunteers and there are collection points in most supermarkets. If you are visiting a supermarket for your own shopping please consider adding a few items to donate in this way. A list of the most urgently required items can be found on the food bank website.

Please note, they are no longer able to accept infant formula milk or baby food due to a UNICEF directive.

Can we urge everyone to consider if they can give a donation of money?
