


Sunday 13th September 2020 14th Sunday after Trinity

Introduction

Last week we started a sermon series on "Communion" by looking at different themes that we find in a traditional Holy Communion service. Although we aren't yet actually sharing the bread and wine in a Communion service there is much more in the wider aspect of the Communion service than that part of the service, and we hope, that through following the series, we will all grow in unity and in the faith of God.

Our second theme is Prayer of Preparation and Worship. How, in our services, do we prepare ourselves to come into the presence of an awesome and Holy God.

For those who have enjoyed following the themes of the Trinity Season we are continuing those with an appropriate prayer and you will find them in the Notices section.

Lighting of Candle

At the start of the services in both our churches a candle will be lit and the following prayer will be said. Those using the virtual service are welcome to do the same.

Dear Lord,

We light this candle as a symbol of your light and grace. Please watch over us all:

Those of us gathered here at St Peter's and Holy Trinity to worship you;

Those who, for whatever reason, are unable to attend our services, but worship with us from their homes;

Those who are no longer here with us but are always in our hearts.

Let your light shine in the darkness so that those that feel lost in these uncertain times can find their way back to you.

Help us all to be a reflection of your light so that those who don't yet know you might begin to see you in us. Amen.

I'd like to open with a prayer before we look at the second aspect of a Communion service in our Communion sermon series, the Prayer of Preparation and Worship;

Lord would you open our hearts to your word and your word to our hearts, Amen.

Being prepared for things is always practicably important, even more so in these times, coming to Church I double check I've packed my mask, because it's important to have the things we need. But the preparation we are looking at today is often much harder to remember to bring to Church, preparing our hearts. This is not a passive action but a deliberate decision to make our hearts right with God - readying ourselves to receive him again. Before Communion it is important that we consciously choose to return to God with our whole hearts. Though important before Communion, it is something that we should practice throughout our lives. We prepare through prayer before Communion, as prayer reminds us to be open to receive God. As we acknowledge the powerful act of prayer in our lives in bringing us right before God. This can be through the prayer of preparation itself but is also found in all aspects of our service; the prayer before this talk also hopefully reminds us to prepare our hearts to be open to receive God's word. Whenever we prepare ourselves to meet with God and intentionally seek his presence - our deliberate coming to him, recognising our unworthiness but preparing our hearts and minds in devotional and prayerful reverence to be in God's awesome and holy presence. This is worship.

Preparing is about acknowledging where we have turned from God. The context of our Psalm 52 reading comes from David's repentance after he is visited by the Prophet Nathan, after sinning against God. David could have felt the shame of his wrongdoing and turned from God but instead he was willing to confess his shortcoming to God and make amends. It can be easy to feel like we've done too much that it is easier to try and ignore, rather than confess what we have done. Instead, like David, we need the courage to acknowledge and face up to what we have done, because by admitting our wrong to God, he is, as Joel reminds us, slow to anger and abounding in love. Within Joel 2:14, Joel offers the question of who can know whether God will turn and have pity on the shortcomings of the Israelites, this is not because we should doubt that such a gracious God will relent but rather shows then the human tendency to

misunderstand and doubt the abundance of God's love. God is always ready; it is our hearts which are unprepared to accept this love. It is not God preventing us from coming to him, it is our own pride and fear when we don't acknowledge and bring our flaws to God which stops us. This Psalm of David should be an example to us; David is a great figure within the Old Testament , not because he was perfect, he was at times far from it, but because when faced with his sin he was humble and courageous, wholeheartedly repenting before God. We must be humble enough to admit that while we are sinful and unprepared to come into the presence of God, prayerful preparation enables us to come to worship. For God wants to welcome us as we are into his presence, it is our unprepared hearts holding us back.

It is this wholeheartedness which is important. David's poetry to God was an outpouring of his heart. The beauty of it comes from the earnestness of his plea to create in him a pure heart. We do not need the sophistication of particular words in a poetic form to turn to God. It is about the intention of our hearts. The simplest of prayers when truly and sincerely meant is just as powerful as any words of David. Often, as I did today, we open a talk with the prayer to open our hearts to God's word: wonderfully simple and yet such powerful words. The steps advocated in Joel 2, declare an entire holy fast and weeping. Intentional fasting and mourning shows us the importance of this preparation. It is not to be done half-heartedly. Minimal effort shows that we do not prioritise coming to God with an open, honest and willing heart.

Joel also cautions against seeing whole-heartedness as simply achieved through this great assembly gathering or fasting, as Joel speaks of rending our hearts to the Lord rather than garments. In Biblical times, such as in Jonah 3:6-9, a key sign of repentance was tearing one's clothes and then often wearing sackcloth. Joel is highlighting the flaw of this, that it is more important to put substance over symbolism. It is easier to look like you have surrendered your heart to God but much more to do this in practice. Often in the Old Testament there was a false sense of security in these acts of repentance. By focusing on the acts, themselves and not the state of the Israelites hearts before God, they often missed the important lesson, which David knows when he asks for a pure heart to be created in him. It's about returning not with actions but with our whole hearts. This is because our separation from God is spiritual rather than a physical distance, thus it is not fixed by physical acts but by the prayer and worship of our very hearts. Like the Israelites going through the motions of returning to God, we can often fall into the trap to

saying the words of the service without really taking on board what it is we're saying and responding meaningfully. I know I often don't have enough time during a service to reflect on what I'm saying with things like the prayer of preparation and how deeply it should affect my attitude in life. Receiving the services in advance and written, has had a positive impact on this. I find myself returning to the words of the service throughout the week time and time again, spending time prayerfully reflecting on what I say each week in Church. We can thus use this new format to truly open our hearts to the words we say. This Communion series will be taking us slowly step by step through the substance behind the words of a Communion service. This will hopefully help us all to both in our actions and our hearts be prepared before God.

As I Girl Guide I was taught the motto "to be prepared", though they meant this with things like not hiking without my first aid kit. As a Christian I can use this as a reminder to check I have prepared my heart before God. For Communion it is to remind us to check our hearts regularly and come to the altar earnestly with open hearts to receive Jesus both into our physical bodies in consuming the consecrated bread and wine and in our souls. While being prepared in heart through earnest prayer is important for us before receiving Communion, this also acts as a regular reminder to us that we should always be opening our hearts to God. Thus, preparing ourselves should be something we regularly consider not just during a Church service. And when preparing it is about the substance to our words and that we mean them, not whether our words or actions look right. For when our heart is aligned with God, our desire will be to do his will, thus the actions will be right when they come from the right place of our heart. Remembering that much like David none of us can always get it right but that is no barrier to our God who is willing and eager to create in us a pure heart when we earnestly ask him to. So, let us say the Prayer of preparation itself, thinking of the importance of each word we are saying whenever we pray this prayer:

Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

We pray for all people who are persecuted or mistreated because of their race, colour or creed, be with them and help to restore peace and love where there is division and anger. Bless and guide Elizabeth our queen, give wisdom to all in authority and direct this and every nation in the ways of justice and peace; that people may honour one another and seek the common good.

Lord in your mercy – **hear our prayer.**

Church Services

All services, for the time being, at Holy Trinity will start at 10am (there will be no 9am service on the second Sunday- it will be 10am).

Services at St Peter's will start at our usual time there at 10.30am.

There is no communion, or refreshments, at present.

To comply with all the Covid-19 secure advice unfortunately we are going to be very restricted on numbers who can attend at both churches.

Because of the restrictions if you wish to attend a service at either church you need to ring or email Heather to ask to be put on a list of attendance for a Sunday. This is vital as we do not want to turn people away.

Those able to attend will be contacted so please do not turn up if you have not been informed that you can attend. A Guidance note has been prepared for all those attending- please read it carefully. It is compulsory that face coverings are worn in the Church

It is compulsory that face coverings are worn in the Church buildings so please come prepared.

Church leaders/preachers/pray-ers are permitted to temporarily lift their face coverings when speaking...but for congregation members it is now mandatory to wear them inside church at all times.

For those not able to attend we will be continuing with services being sent out by email and resources being sent in the post as at present. The Churches' Premises are still closed to everyone outside service times and entry can only take place with the agreement of Heather or in her absence the Churchwardens – please do not attempt to access them with any keys that you may have.

We would ask for your prayers during what is going to be a difficult and developing situation.

Harvest

Sadly, there will <u>not</u> be a harvest collection of tinned/packet food this year. We will not be able to do an auction of fresh produce either. Instead we will be taking a cash collection for those who would like to give in that way. If in church - there will be an envelope for your gifts (Hartshill's gifts will be split between the local food bank and Aim for Change which is a charity we have supported in the past), Galley Common's gifts will all go to the local food bank. If you are not physically in the building – see below for details of how you can support on line or in different ways.

Food Bank

Due to the restrictions of the volunteers / space at the local foodbank warehouse we are **still not able** to continue with the bringing of items to Church or deliveries to the warehouse.

This is at a time when the Food Bank is still under huge pressure.

The Food Bank is still working with its volunteers and there are collection points in most supermarkets. If you are visiting a supermarket for your own shopping please consider adding a few items to donate in this way. A list of the most urgently required items can be found on the food bank website.

Please note, they are no longer able to accept infant formula milk or baby food due to a UNICEF directive.

Can we urge everyone to consider if they can give a donation of money? Please visit their website- www.nuneaton.foodbank.org.uk and click on the Donate button at the top right of the page.

This is a really valuable way we can collectively as Churches show our love to the vulnerable people in our society – especially as we are not able to support them with our usual harvest collection of tinned/packet food.

Daily Hope

Daily Hope is a <u>free phone line</u> of hymns, reflections and prayers launched by the Church of England. It has been set up particularly with those unable
